Write Trait Lesson - April 13th Organization

One of the most important things to consider when we are planning our writing is to think about our **lead** or **beginning**. A strong lead is going to hook the reader and have them excited to read on! A plain or boring lead might just scare them away or send them to look for something more interesting to read.

Example 1: You choose the Lead-er!

Here are two different leads for two different pieces of writing. In each case, read both leads and then decide which one (A or B) works better. Be prepared to explain why you chose that lead.

Two possible leads for the a story about a calf.

- **A.** We live on a ranch with lots of cattle. For some reason, one calf did not want to drink milk from her mother the way a calf usually does. She would get sick if she didn't. My grandpa and dad had to push the mother into a small pen. They milked her into a baby bottle and then fed the calf through the bottle.
- **B.** Without her mother's milk, my grandma said our new baby calf would get sick and die. I didn't want that to happen, but the little calf would not snuggle up under her mom and drink and already she was almost too weak to stand. Grandpa said we would have to do something drastic. He and Dad would herd the nervous mother into the chute and milk her into a bottle for the calf. This was the little calf's only chance, so I sure hoped it would work.
